

Registration will be open very soon, complete with more details about the event's workshops and schedule. The per-day cost is \$75, and it's \$150 for all three days.

However, there are multiple discounts available. If you register before January 1, 2019, you'll receive an early-bird discount of \$10 (one day) or \$25 (two or all three days). On top of this discount, you'll receive another \$10 discount if your church sends 2–3 members, and \$20 off if they send 4 or more.

Adult Faith Formation "Percolate"

Percolate is reading and discussing Stand Your Ground: Black Bodies and the Justice of God by theologian Kelly Brown Douglas. Douglas argues that the climate in our society that makes killing unarmed black people inevitable and even permissible has roots in the myth of Anglo-Saxon superiority and American exceptionalism.

This book, like others, has us saying, "Why didn't I know this." It is an extension of our study of White Privilege and will serve us well in living out our calling and commitment to being Just Peace individuals and a Just Peace church.

As usual all are welcome, whether or not you've read the book. We meet around 8:30 a.m. before the worship service and the coffee will be percolating.
