I was walking amidst the Ponderosa pines at La Foret a few weeks ago during my post sabbatical retreat. I must admit I was still trying to acclimate to being back at church, diving right into all the church stuff, trying to stay present to all the goings on. I would be lying if I didn't tell you I was agitated and frustrated while trying to switch gears. But then I heard this voice in the midst of my bitching session with God. Simply, I heard, *'this is a gift'*. My first thought was 'well, Divine one, I hope you saved the receipt 'cause this is one of the worst gifts ever!' But as I returned to the cabin, with no more certainty than before, I was coming to terms with this idea of *gift*.

These past, almost 2 years now, could be called almost anything other than a gift. There has been so much uncertainty, and grief and loss, and fear and isolation, that calling it a gift would be tantamount to minimizing so much suffering. Yet, for me, there exists in these so called ashes of loss and chaos, a mystifying sensation of gratitude. Don't get me wrong, I would trade it in if it meant alleviating so much suffering. It's just that the gratitude comes from being able to *feel* it all: to empathize and have compassion; to experience discomfort in the chaos while also experiencing comfort in a digital community; to be able to recognize further, all that needs to be done to seek justice; to have awareness of the need for companionship and community; the frustration of not being able to fix things; the overwhelming sense of confusion and hopelessness. It may seem weird to identify any of this as *gift* until we recognize that for every feeling we experience, we are gifted with an understanding of what other humans might be going through. This can become a gift which calls us into relationship with those perhaps we never would have considered. This is a gift that when it is accepted with gratitude and humility, can propel us into a more profound experience of empathy and compassion than we ever thought we could have.

Of course, there is also so much gratitude for this Beloved community and how we have all continued to show up, not only for one another, but for our larger community. We have extended our church community by being available beyond our four walls. We have maintained our building even as we met online. And we have met our fiscal responsibilities to our missions even in the midst of all that has been challenging. Even now we still remain steadfast in our commitments, even as the future remains challenging and somewhat unknown. *All of this is gift.*

## ADVENT, 2021

Advent marks the four weeks before Christmas where we take time to anticipate, contemplate, pray, and wait for the birth of the Christ Child.

- Friday December 24 – Christmas Eve
- Sunday December 26 – The First Sunday after Christmas

Evictions Remain Flat' 10/21/21

I am writing this letter to inform you that the number of “evictions” and stated percentages in the article may not be fully accurate means for gauging whether people are losing their housing due to challenges during the Covid-19 moratorium. I offer as preponderance, an Oct. 2021 experience:

I was informed that I owed back rent, due immediately. This was due to an oversight in a 33 pg. lease. My rent had increased \$150/mo. effective 06/01/21; without notification. It was deemed that I was legally responsible for this amount. Denied a payment plan, I gave 30 days notice. The response was 10 days to Remit or Surrender and accrue additional charges.

This apartment is part of Colorado Apartment Association. The same association whose general counsel, Drew Hamrick, was quoted in the article. They are not part of any government or social service agency. They have 433,000 apartments in Colorado. Does Hamrick’s numbers include Colorado’s other 424,500 rentals? My own experience makes me think the measuring tools are inaccurate. The Courts, Community Development Division, and Colorado Springs Housing Authority have stats also. I wonder if the process of “remit or surrender” serves as a smokescreen that clouds our ability to see what is actually happening in the area of housing retention in Colorado Springs.

This letter is not my story. It is an invitation to us all, to also look through the lens of the marginalized, when we look at injustice. Complete truth should be our guidance.

### **Greetings from Mallory**

Greetings, beloved VGCC family-

We are turning the corner on the closing of another church year and, my goodness, what an eventful year it has been. Between navigating our online Christmas service to Clare’s sabbatical and all of the phenomenal guest speakers to re-opening the church and saying goodbye to our beloved Jim Sailor, it has been a year full of unexpected graces in and among some pretty devastating losses. It has been, though, an incredible year of faith and I have been privileged to travel alongside each of you through it.

One important theme of this church year, for me, has been placing our faith into tangible action. This has long been VGCC’s legacy and it has been just as true if not even more so this year. The decision to live into the hybrid space of re-opening the church and maintaining our Zoom worship component is an incredible example of drawing the circle of God’s love as wide as possible so that all can join in and be part of this community of faith. This commitment is part of our covenantal promises to each other – that we will adjust according to the needs of the people we are in relationship with, even when it calls us out of our comfort zone and into the wild unknown!

I also want to express how incredibly proud of this community and the ways that we show up for the hard stuff. On the short notice of just a couple of hours, more than 20 people gathered to support Jim through his transition into God's presence. We looked death in the face and proclaimed a love that is stronger than death. That was an incredible act of faith and spiritual fortitude and was, by far and away, the most holy experience I have had as a pastor. It took courage and tenderness and abundant grace and I could not be more honored to be part of this community.

At Jim's funeral, Jim's brother Roy read the Parable of the Good Samaritan and challenged the people in attendance to see Jim and other people with learning disabilities as the Good Samaritan and not the person who was victimized. I was struck by his reading of this famous story because his interpretation of it was, in its own way, reading the Bible from the margins – specifically those who are disabled. Those of us with temporarily able bodies may read ourselves as the Good Samaritan and those with disabilities as needing our assistance, but Roy “flipped the script” so to speak and highlighted Jim's generosity and willingness to jump in and help.

Learning to read the Bible from the margins is a skill we are developing and will continue to develop through Advent and on into the new calendar year. Percolate has been studying Reading the Bible from the Margins by Dr. Miguel de la Torre, an enlightening and challenging read! We have also embarked on a bible study of the Gospel of Mark, which I like to think of as the gospel from the margins. If you want to jump in on either of these studies, please feel free! As of this writing, we have only made it through about 10 verses of Mark so you won't be too far behind, I promise!

Mark is often known as a story of discipleship – it starts with Jesus's baptism, where he hears a call from God that will change his life forever. It then continues with Jesus calling the disciples to become “fishers of men” and teaching them about his vision for the world. As we, two millennia later, discern what it means to be disciples in our day and age, there is much spiritual nourishment to be found in these pages. Though our situations may be different, the call to walk step by faithful step, leaving behind those things which hold us back, remains the same.

This new church year will present us with some challenges and opportunities for courageous discipleship. I pray that God will equip each of us for the work that is to come so we are able to meet the challenges and dilemmas ahead with clarity, compassion and, above all, the radical love of neighbor which calls us beyond our fear. I am so glad to be your companion on this journey and I am looking forward to all the surprises, challenges, grace, and community this year holds.

Mission/Outreach is an integral part of VGUCC ministries. We will pursue opportunities that are **reflective of Justice and Peace**, denominational and ecumenical, local and global, participatory and financial. Our mission and outreach will make a difference – empowering recipients and inspiring givers to act in the spirit of Christ; exemplifying the 3 Great Loves: Love of Neighbor; Love of Children; Love of Creation.

Chinook Center's Sunday free food distribution is making a huge difference for nearly 20 households of seniors at a Section 8 apartment building downtown.

### Inside Out Youth Services.

Ally Up is the major fundraiser for Inside Out. The theme for this year's Ally Up was, **Access, Equity, Power**. It was a marvelous evening of learning about the need for safe/brave space for LGBTQIA2+ youth like Marshall(he/him) and celebrating 31 years of Inside Out's impact with great performances and testimony from youth, community leaders and partners, staff, and allies. Together, we raised over \$75,000 toward our goal of \$100,000! This year was our second virtual Ally Up. There were over 200 viewers online and in person, over 300 unique site visits the night of the event, and 30 Ally Up watch parties hosted across the state by Inside Out's allies and partners! Because of Ally Up, the LGBTQIA2+ youth of El Paso and Teller counties are able to **access** a necessary safe space through Inside Out's evidence-backed programs. Every 100% tax-deductible contribution helps us in the fight for **equity** among all people, no matter their identity. We joined in building **power** with the LGBTQIA2+ young people of the Pikes Peak region.



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Research shows that when these youth have a safe space and caring, supportive allies, they are half as likely to engage in risky behaviors. As human beings, we long for community and connectedness, and by building strong interpersonal relationships, youth are empowered, develop life skills, and grow in confidence and competence. Inside Out has been here for LGBTQIA2+ and allied youth for 31 years, and we keep expanding our capacity and community impact through adult education, outreach, and activism, all building **access, equity** and **power** for youth.


### Adult Faith Formation “Percolate” 8:30 a.m.
