The New Life of Spring—Pastor Clare

Greetings Beloved Community,

Yesterday, as my wife and I were walking in town, I caught the unmistakable smell of the warm air mingling with a hint of some kind of blossom. Perhaps, part of this was my own imagination or desire for spring to arrive sooner than later. Either way it was a welcome feeling! And yet, as I write this, I am aware that we are in the midst of what most of us would call a typical Colorado March. One day we are anticipating some kind of disruptive weather which most forecasters cannot nail down with any kind of confidence. It will most likely include wind, undifferentiated moisture guaranteed to make our travels miserable, and bring frigid temperatures. Then, within 48 hours we will most likely then have a day or two sporting higher temperatures, and the scents and promise of spring and 'sproutings'. One day we may feel as if 'winter' will never give up its hold on us and the next day we find that there is a hint of newness reminding us of potential and sacred hope in what might be. Truly, could we have a better metaphor for the Lenten season—or even just life in general?

I imagine that in the midst of his life, especially in those final months, Jesus was confronted with a myriad of uncertainties. In his world, life was difficult. Poverty was pervasive as was the fear of doing something that could land someone in the crosshairs of the empire. He and his friends traveled from place to place attempting to bring some kind of solace to those who were most vulnerable, while challenging those who would put themselves above others for their own gain. He was indeed, comforting the afflicted and afflicting the comfortable. Yet in this precarious time, one thing remains clear: he was never alone. This small band of roguish followers remained mostly true, the tenuous nature their lives bolstered by their loyalty to one another and the word and deeds they were attempting to exhort. We can imagine that, like the uncertainty of this season, there were days filled with fear, and perhaps even the sense of potential heartache and misery. And to be sure there were days which hinted at what might be, the comfort and warmth of the spring sun and the promise of new life.

I must admit that for as much as I can identify the cyclical nature of life with all its joys and laments; as much as I think I understand the profound metaphors offered in nature's seasons, reminding us of that the 'dead of winter' ushers in the new life of spring; as much as I know that grief can eventually give way to joy and repeat again, I often forget.

I think this is why that in all of this Lenten season, I find myself most connected with Maundy Thursday, the institution of the last and yet first supper. This tangible memory of friends coming together to celebrate a most sacred holiday and to also celebrate their lives and loves with and for each other. This consummate example of life: joy in the midst of impending lament, love in the midst of loss, life in the midst of death. This one act, summarizing the life and loves of this small band of world changers, in which we still to this day participate as if we ourselves were there.

I guess what I am trying to say is this: We are in good company. In fact we are in the very best company. With all our lives and its challenges, joys, uncertainties, laments, celebrations; with all the exhausting work in which our faith calls us to participate; in all the risks we are asked to take, the discomfort we may have as status quo is challenged, the fears we work to overcome, we have been and remain in good company. This Beloved Community is not just a church which follows Jesus. This community is an extension of that original band of misfits who chose to put their trust in the Beloved, a God who walked with them through all of it. This my friends, is our legacy above and beyond all else. A legacy of discipleship and community which embraces all life and worth of all creation.

I pray that this Lenten season reminds all of us of this profound gift: to be able to feel and participate in life in such a way that we are aware of our bond with this original community who chose to trust and follow that brown skin Palestinian Jew, Jesus. May our trust in this, and our covenantal relationships, open us to the promise of what is yet to come.

Message from Pastor Mallory

.Beloveds,

We are fully arriving in the Lenten season and looking forward to the seasons of Easter and Pentecost which are to come. Every year, we get to lean into the wisdom of the church year and learn from its rhythms and themes. It is my prayer for us that this year is one we approach with intention, as what has been true within us is made manifest between and beyond us.

As a congregation, we are spending this Lent engaging deeply with the prophetic, lamenting voice of Rev. Dr. James Cone, known as the father of Black liberation theology, specifically through his book The Cross and the Lynching Tree. Much of the language we use about Lent is about journeying and wandering, especially in solidarity with Jesus and his time spent in the desert. It is a time which will challenge us, disrupt us, and deepen us. It strikes me, though, that the energy I hope we bring to this Lenten practice is one of slowness and stillness. That we stay with our feelings. That we not rush by what needs to be attended to and grieved. We are journeying in the stillness. It's an apparent contradiction that strangely makes sense in this season. Our Lenten series will culminate in a **contemplative antiracism retreat being held** at La Foret on April 9th. Here, again, we will learn and practice the art of attending to, staying with, and grieving the suffering racism has caused. I hope you will attend, as these things must be held together in community. Your presence and vulnerability in that space would be a gift.

One of my professors, Dr. Albert Hernandez, taught me that the season between Easter and Pentecost is a powerful time of discernment. In fact, in Arthurian legend, Pentecost was when many of the Knights of the Round Table "got their quest", usually from a supernatural Other. Our goal is to establish an antiracism team who will help craft a statement so we can assume the mantle of and name for ourselves our identity as an antiracist church.

Though they may appear unconnected, the truth is that our work as an antiracist church is deeply bound up with our work in partnership with Archway Communities and our discernment of supporting an affordable housing development on our land. We have long called ourselves a church which embodies Radical Hospitality which has led us to bravely venture into the work of deconstruction of heterosexism and homophobia, racism, ability and access, mental health, and more. The astounding truth we have discovered in this work is that, through the kinship and calling of God, there is no one who is not our sibling. We are being called to further invest in this work and put it into tangible, life-changing action so we can fully live it out in community with those society has called "other" than us.

I know that the possibility of sharing space and community with new people can be an intimidating prospect, full of questions of whys and hows. As we begin to invest in this process, starting with a first **steering committee meeting on March 22**nd **at 7pm**, we will also seek to resource ourselves and begin answering some of those how-to questions. In this vein, we will be hosting a conversation about drug use and addiction through a harm reduction lens, in partnership with the Southern Colorado Health Network on May 14th at 1pm. I invite you to participate in this process as much as you can – your voice and presence matters and will shape how we go forward as a community.

Overall, I am so grateful to be part of this courageous family of faith who bravely steps forward into the unknown, trusting that God will meet us there and equip us for what is to come. It is a privilege and an honor to be with you on this journey, through Lent and beyond.
